CALL TO ORDER - The Governing Body met for a regular meeting and the following commission members were present in the commission chambers: Mayor Camalla Leonhard, Mayor Pro-Tem Jermaine Wilson, Commissioners Nancy Bauder, Edd Hingula and Griff Martin.

OLD BUSINESS:

Consideration of Previous Meeting Minutes:

Commissioner Wilson moved to accept the minutes from the January 25, 2022 regular meeting. Commissioner Martin seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Second Consideration Ordinance:

Commissioner Wilson moved to open the public hearing. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Review of Properties by Staff:

City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner reviewed the request for the wavier.

- City Code allows for a waiver to permit alcoholic liquor to be sold or served from a location within 300 feet from any church, school, nursing home, library or hospital
- Immaculate Conception Church located at 711 N 5th is having its annual St. Patrick's Corned Beef and Cabbage Dinner on March 13th, and St. Joseph Church located at 306 N. Broadway is having its annual German Fest Dinner and Dance on October 1st, and are requesting a waiver to apply for the temporary liquor licenses for these events
- Letters were sent to all property owners within 300 feet of the locations notifying them of the public hearing

General Items:

Review Draft of 2021 KDHE Annual Report for Stormwater – Public Works Director Brian Faust reviewed the draft report. The guidelines for the activities to be reported on are set by the revised Stormwater Management Program which was adopted by the City Commission on October 27, 2020 and these guidelines were used in 2021. The report is required to be submitted annually and it is suggested by KDHE and EPA that the report be available for review in a public forum and allow time for public comment. The report will come back to the City Commission for approval at the February 22, 2022 meeting to allow time for public comments. No action is needed by the Commission at this time.

Resolutions:

Commissioner Bauder moved to adopt Resolution B-2304 Section Eight Management Assessment Program. Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Resolution B-2305 Set Limits for General Improvements Bonds – Finance Director Ruby Maline presented for adoption and approval Resolution B-2305 setting the maximum amount for 2022 General Improvement Bonds in the amount of \$2,125,013.00. This amount is set by Charter Ordinance 56.

Commissioner Martin moved to adopt Resolution B-2305 Set Limits for General Improvement Bonds. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Resolution B-2306 Authorizing Sale of 2022-A Bonds, A2022 Temp Notes – Finance Director Ruby Maline presented Resolution B-2306 authorizing and providing for the public sale of General Obligation Bonds, Series 2022-A, Temporary Notes, Series A2022 and authorizing the call and redemption of the Series A2021 Temporary Notes of the City.

Commissioner Bauder moved to adopt Resolution B-2306 authorizing and providing for the public sale of General Obligation Bonds, Series 2022-A, and Temporary Notes, Series A2022, setting for the details of the sale and authorizing the call and redemption of the Series A2021 Temporary Notes. Commissioner Martin seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Resolution B-2307 Redemption of Series 2016A TIF Bonds (Second Hotel Project) — City Manager Paul Kramer presented the resolution calling all of the outstanding principal amount of the bonds maturing on and after September 1, 2022, in the principal amount of \$465,000.00 for redemption and payment on March 10, 2022.

Commissioner Hingula moved to approve Resolution B-2307 call for the redemption of the Full Faith and Credit Tax Increment Bonds, Series 2016-A (Second Hotel Project). Commissioner Wilson seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. Mayor Leonhard declared the motion carried 5-0.

Bids, Contracts and Agreements:

Consider Bids for Phone System Separation from the County – Assistant City Manager Penny Holler and IT Specialist I Howard Kings presented for consideration the telephone system separation project, which would separate the City's phone system from the County and facilitate the purchase of voice gateways, routers, and licensing.

Ms. Holler:

• The phone system is currently under the county government umbrella, this separation would only impact the city and county office phones.

Mr. Kings:

- In November of 2021 the County approved separation of the phone systems
- By separating our systems, we are updating our systems and ensuring compliance with Kari's Law
- Would not take a significant amount of time to implement
- Would not affect 9-1-1 capabilities

ANALYSIS:

The subject property is owned by Greenamyre Rentals, Inc., plat prepared by McAfee Henderson Solutions. The applicant is requesting approval of the 2nd Avenue Estates residential development, located at 2604 S. 2nd Avenue. The subject property is 5.05 acres in size, and is occupied by one single family home. The site consists of one existing lot and is zoned PUD, Planned Unit Development. The plat consists of 3 lots and 1 tract, with accompanying Right of Way for Vilas Circle.

The property was rezoned from R1-6, High Density Single Family Residential to PUD in 2003 to accommodate the development of age-restricted townhomes, with a layout largely similar to what is intended to be built at this time. The proposed site plan is included in this packet for informational purposes only, and is not subject to City Commission review and approval. The proposed project is being developed as a Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) project, as approved by the State of Kansas.

The plat was discussed at the January 13, 2022 Development Review Committee meeting. Items related to stormwater, parking, and circulation were discussed. All items discussed will be addressed prior to issuance of building permits and do not require modification to the plat as submitted. The Planning Commission considered this item at their February 7, 2022 meeting and voted unanimously to approve the plat. The plat is before the City Commission for the purpose of accepting the dedication of land for public purposes in the form of public utility easements and right-of-way that are associated with the plat.

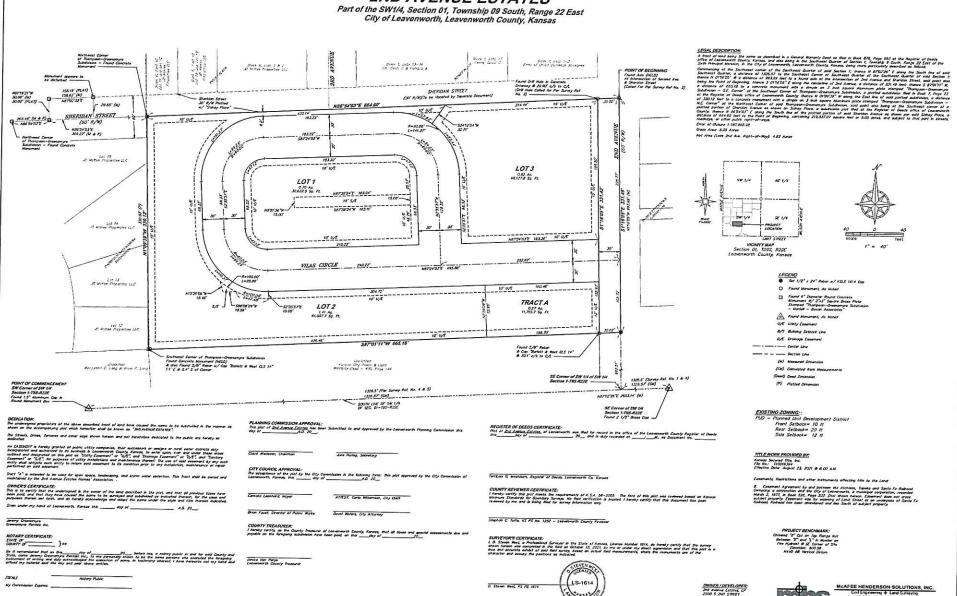
Staff recommends accepting the dedication of land for public purposes for the 2nd Avenue Estates Final Plat.

CONSIDER PARKING LOT REPAIR LOCATION FOR INCLUSION IN THE 2022 & 2023 PAVEMENT MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

ISSUE:

Consider the parking lots to be repaired in the 2022 and 2023 Pavement Management Program (PMP).

BACKGROUND:

In 2018, the Commission expressed the desire to have one (1) City parking lot a year repaired as part of the annual Pavement Management Program.

For 2022, staff identified three lots in the downtown with a fourth lot at the Public Library that are in need of rehabilitation:

- o City Hall lot on the east side of City Hall (100 N. 5th Street) heavily used during working hours.
- NW corner of Delaware and Esplanade Street (100 Delaware Street) used by both businesses and Community Center.
- SW corner of Cherokee and 2nd Street (201 Cherokee).
- Leavenworth Public Library parking lot (417 Spruce Street).

Three of the lots in consideration for the 2022 and 2023 program are constructed of concrete while one is asphalt. Work in the proposed lots will include:

- 1. Removal and replacement of overgrown trees and landscaping
- Removal and replacement of failed curb
- 3. Removal and replacement of broken/settled concrete or asphalt
- 4. Removal and replacement of failed sidewalk
- 5. Installation of compliant ADA ramps
- 6. Installation of eco-friendly stormwater structures where applicable
- 7. Replacement of striping

With the overall size of the library parking lot, staff may recommend repairing concrete joints and overlaying the existing concrete with asphalt.

A map of each lot is attached to this policy report.

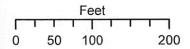
Plans for the repairs will be completed by Alfred Benesch in conjunction with plan preparation for the 2022 Pavement Management Program. Work will be completed by the general contractor who performs the work involved with the Pavement Management Program. To help accelerate the 2023 program, staff requests that the Commission also select a parking lot for next year.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is looking for a consensus of the Commission as to which lots they desire to be included in the 2022 and 2023 Pavement Management Program.

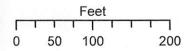

ISSUE:

Adopt a resolution approving the annual KDHE report for 2021 stormwater activities.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Leavenworth is regulated by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) and US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a Phase II City for stormwater purposes. The City has been required to submit an annual report on stormwater activities every year since 2003. The report summarizes actions the City has taken the previous year to protect and enhance stormwater quality.

KDHE and EPA suggest that the report be reviewed in a public forum rather than simply submitted by staff. The draft report was reviewed by the Commission on February 8th, 2022 and is available on the City's website. One email was received regarding stormwater issues along Vilas Street (attached).

The final report includes statements that the City has reduced pollution in accordance with the requirements to the "Maximum Extent Practicable" (MEP). Staff opinion is that the City has met the intent of the regulations to reduce pollution through the Six Minimum Control Measures as described in the report.

There is considerable additional information in the appendices that will be included when the report is submitted.

RECOMMENDATION:

The report is due at KDHE on February 28th via digital delivery. It is recommended the City Commission adopt the resolution supporting the final report at the February 22nd Commission meeting.

Executive Summary

SECTION 1: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

To satisfy the requirements of the NPDES permit, this annual report summarizes the City of Leavenworth's plans and actions to reduce the discharge of pollutants from the municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) to the maximum extent practicable, to protect water quality, and to meet the appropriate water quality requirements of the Clean Water Act. The information contained within this report was obtained through interviews with City staff, review of permits and projects from 2021, and examining communications and publications made available to the citizens of Leavenworth.

The COVID-19 Pandemic continued to impact the City of Leavenworth activities through 2021. These impacts included sudden absences of key persons and the inability to fill vacant positions in our Operations Division.

City staff pursue activities in all of the Six Minimum Control Measures throughout the year. Key observations for the purposes of this report are shown below.

- Were there any aspects of the program that appeared especially effective at reducing pollutants in your stormwater discharge?
 - Contractor and public compliance with implementation of the Land Disturbance Permit requirements is improved over the initial years and is generally satisfactory.
 - o Street sweeping is an effective tool for removing pollutants.
 - Use of "Stormwater Utility" funds to address long-standing small to medium-sized issues has reduced erosion in several locations through the "Orange Fence Repair Projects".
- Were there any aspects of the program that provided unsatisfactory results?

While most items identified as BMPs (Best Management Practices) are believed to be effective at some level, the passive education and information sharing such as leaving material at the library and having informational brochures available on the City's website were probably the least effective tools identified.

· What was the most successful part of the program?

The visibly effective measures of correctly installed construction site runoff control and post-construction activities were the most successful parts of the program.

What was the most challenging aspect of the program?

The most challenging was having developers install and maintain construction site

runoff control. To address this issue, the City issued a stop-work order for a residential development due to failure to install required measures. While the issues were immediately corrected, this is an area that requires continual observation to help ensure compliance.

Describe any City/County area MS4 clean ups and the participation.

- After being unable to conduct a City-Wide Clean Up in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions, the City of Leavenworth was again able to sponsor a "City-Wide" clean-up day with about 35-50 groups picking up trash. This event was held on April 10, 2021.
- Leavenworth County provides HHW (Household Hazardous Waste) services throughout the year and a special event to dispose of HHW was held at the Municipal Service Center in June.
- The City has a "Three-Mile Creek" monthly clean-up program in which citizens pick up trash. In 2021, there were six citizen groups that received a \$500 donation per group from transient guest tax dollars in 2021.
- Describe the elected officials' participation in the stormwater pollution elimination.

The City Commission has supported stormwater pollution elimination by creating a "Stormwater Utility" that is funded by a fee on all properties. This fee is used to address longstanding stormwater problems in the community, typically including reduction or elimination of erosion that has been causing failed roadways, culverts and streambanks. The Commission has also supported staff goal to have all public and private projects have some level of permanent water quality improvement included.

The City Commission reviewed and approved the new Stormwater Management Plan (SMP) on October 27, 2020. Staff was also direct to proceed with ordinances related to fees/fines for operation of BMP installations, construction sites, grease traps and general maintenance of permanent water quality structures.

- Describe the collaboration with other organizations to eliminate stormwater pollution.
 - The City coordinated a "City-Wide" clean-up day with about 35-50 groups.
 - Leavenworth County provided one HHW (Household Hazardous Waste) collection service in June 2021.

There were no known inspections of the MS4 program by KDHE or EPA in 2021.

City of Leavenworth opinion is that the information shown in each of the "Six Minimum Control Measures" tables support the conclusion that meaningful reduction in discharge of pollutants has occurred. The global pandemic in 2020 and 2021 restricted the number and size of public meetings. This impacted the Public Education/Outreach as well as the Public Involvement/Participation minimum control measures.

2. Provide results of information collected and analyzed, (for example test results, surveys, or public comments/input) during the annual reporting period. This may include monitoring data used to assess the success of best management practices with respect to reduction in pollutant discharge. Include an interpretation of the information which addresses success or failure of the portion of the program for which the information applies.

The City has collected information on a wide variety of municipal activities associated with various BMPs. This includes data on street sweeping, deicing use (salt), grease trap program, land disturbance permit issuance, SSO reporting, BMP operation (particularly detention basins) annual meeting and others. There has been no overall "trend" noticed in this data, but it is indicative of the effort of our community to be aware of important issues related to water quality. Specific data for many of these reporting items is in the assessment of the various BMP activities for the last year. It is clear that staff, public, contractors and businesses are aware of the various permitting programs associated with the SMP, and water quality is improved and/or maintained as a result. Participation in individual programs may have been reduced during the year due to COVID.

I am responding to the article in the February 15th, Leavenworth Times, seeking public comment on the stormwater report due to KDHE by February 28th.

Although the article gave what was the location of the draft report in public works section of the city's website, I was unable to locate the specific report. I was able to review various information and maps located in the section but found no mention of the issues with stormwater run off the citizens in the area of Valhala, Vilas, Holman, between 13th and 14th Streets are experiencing during heavy rains.

Although a storm drain is located just west of 1313 Vilas on the south side of the street, there is an issue of storm water taking the route of our driveway and the area between 1313 Vilas and the house next door on the east. During heavy rains these waters sidestep the storm drain, going down the drive and east yard like a stream, to the back west line, and ending up creating a quagmire for the neighboring houses on Holman and the south side of Vilas west of our home.

I had visited the Public Works department in person and was able to share this situation with three engineers and the department assistant last summer. They said they would visit the area and respond but did not do so. This was in the summer of 2021.

As we discussed the area, it was mentioned possibly the lack of curbs on the south side of Vilas was the cause of the storm water not reaching the drain. These homes had been built in the 1970s prior to curbs being required. It was also prior to all the homes on Valhala being built and probably this very steep street itself which flows nearly straight into the drive at 1313 Vilas.

I had asked what could be done to put in curbs, even suggesting affected property owners sharing in the cost. As I said, no one responded.

This situation effects 4 houses on the south side of Vilas plus at least three homes on the north side of Holman.

Please share my comments with Leavenworth City Commissioners prior to their considering approval of the final version of the report on February 22nd.

Thank you for your assistance in helping make the City of Leavenworth a great, safe and healthy place to live.

ISSUE:

The issue is to review the bids received for the mowing of various parks and other City owned properties.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Leavenworth Parks Department utilizes contractual mowing to assist with the mowing responsibilities of the department. Many of the areas utilized by this contract are small City owned properties such as intersections and rights-of-way, as well as various parks. In 2018, Superior Lawn bid on the contract with an extremely low bid and have performed the work within this low bid amount since that time including a one year extension. The contract expired at the end of the 2021 mowing season and Superior Lawn chose not to extend the contract for a second year extension. With that in mind, a bid proposal package was developed and we advertised for bids. This new bid contract is for three years. The City will have the option to extend the contract for a two-year period with the option of a 6% price increase for the renewal of the two-year extension with agreement of both parties. This contract is broken down into two separate groups. These groups can be awarded to a single contractor or split between contractors based on bids received with a maximum number of mowing's set at 26 cycles for the season.

On February 2, 2022 at 2:00pm, bids were opened. We received four bids as follows:

ISSUE:

Review bids received for replacement of cooling towers at the Riverfront Community Center.

BACKGROUND:

The existing cooling towers at the Riverfront Community Center were replaced in 2001. In 2009 upgrades were made to some of the piping, variable speed drives, fan motors and pulley kits. Over the past few years the exterior housing of the towers has shown significant areas of rusting through. Staff have hired local contractors to patch failing areas and make repairs/alterations as needed to keep the towers running. It became quite evident that the towers were in need of replacement and as such, a set of bid specifications were developed and published at local media sites as well as posted at Drexel Technologies. A mandatory pre-bid meeting was held Friday, February 4, 2022, at 10:00 am. Bids were opened on Wednesday, February 16, 2022, at 10:00 am.

ISSUE:

Consider bids received for the Cody Park Stream Improvements.

BACKGROUND:

During a routine inspection of the sanitary sewer paralleling the creek at Cody Park, Engineering staff found that the concrete encased sanitary sewer line had been exposed due to erosion of the stream bank. Additional investigation of the area found substantial erosion of the creek bank downstream, primarily next to the Parks' shelter house. This erosion, if allowed to continue, will jeopardize the stability of the sanitary sewer line located in the stream bank and will continue to creep closer to the shelter house.

In October of 2021, the City contracted with Napier Engineering to design a project to stabilize the creek bank and repair the sanitary sewer encasement. Plans and specifications and the project was advertised for bid in the Leavenworth Times and at Drexel Technologies in January 2022. The bid opening was on February 15th, 2022.

Bids received for the project are listed below. The lowest qualified base bid was from Linaweaver Construction in the amount of \$65,450.

Linaweaver Construction is an established contractor that has done numerous jobs for the City.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The project will be funded with monies from the sewer fund and stormwater fee. The project is anticipated to start in March and will take 30 calendar days to complete. Inspection work will be performed by City.

POLICY:

The City Commission generally awards a contract to the lowest bidder if the bid is less than the Engineer's estimate and whose evaluation by the City indicates that the award will be in the best interest of the City. While Linaweaver's bid was slightly higher than the engineer's estimate (4%), staff feels that there is no benefit from rebidding the project.

RECOMMENDATION:
Staff recommends that the City Commission accept the low bid received from Linaweaver Construction in the amount of \$65,450 for the Cody Park Stream Improvements.

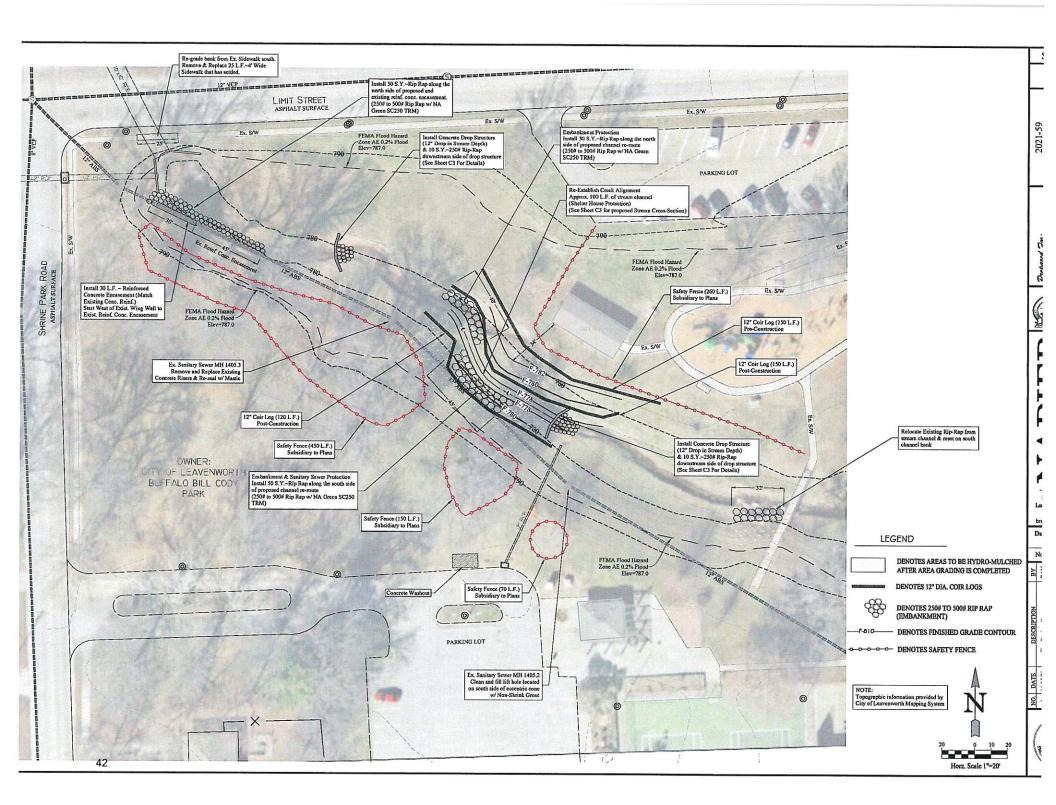
Bid Tabs Plan Sheet C2

ORDINANCE NO.	
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AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,450,000 AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, SERIES 2022-A, OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS, UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF K.S.A. 10-101 TO 125, INCLUSIVE, AND CHARTER ORDINANCE NO. 56 OF THE CITY, ALL AS AMENDED.

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, (the "City") has, in accordance with the powers of home rule of all cities of the State of Kansas under Section 5 of Article 12 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, passed and approved, by the vote of not less than two-thirds of the members-elect of the governing body of the City, Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City, which charter ordinance was published once each week for two consecutive weeks in the official newspaper of the City with such charter ordinance taking effect, without protest, on the sixty-first (61st) day following the publication thereof; and

WHEREAS, Charter Ordinance No. 56 both exempted the City from the provisions of K.S.A. 13-1024a, which was applicable to the City but not uniformly applicable to all Kansas cities and therefor was, in accordance with the City's powers of home rule, subject to the City's authority to exempt itself from the whole or any part of said K.S.A. 13-1024a, and, in accordance with such power of home rule, provided substitute and additional provisions on the same subject as in both K.S.A. 13-1024a; and

WHEREAS, the City has, pursuant to Resolution No. B-2276 of the City adopted February 19, 2021, authorized the construction of certain general improvements in the total estimated amount of \$2,038,938 (the "Improvements") to be made in the City under the authority of Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has heretofore duly authorized, issued and delivered its \$1,400,000 Temporary Notes, Series A2021, dated May 12, 2021, (the "Series A2021 Notes") pursuant to Resolution No. B-2281 (the "Series A2021 Note Resolution") adopted April 27, 2021, in accordance with the requirements of Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City to temporarily finance the costs of the Improvements, which Series A2021 Notes maturing on December 1, 2022, in the amount of \$1,400,000 will be redeemed and paid on June 1, 2022, from proceeds of the Bonds authorized herein and other legally available funds of the City; and

WHEREAS, the Series A2021 Notes are subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity, in whole or in part, at any time on or after June 1, 2022, at the option of the City, at the redemption price of 100% of the principal amount thereof plus accrued interest thereon to the date of redemption; and

WHEREAS, all legal requirements pertaining to the Improvements have been complied with and the total cost thereof, including bond issuance costs, is \$1,464,673.45 (the "Project Cost") to be financed with the proceeds of general obligation bonds of the City in the principal amount of \$1,450,000 with the balance of such Project Cost payable from bond premium, if any; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with all of the foregoing, the City deems it necessary and advisable to issue and sell its General Obligation Bonds, Series 2022-A, in the aggregate principal amount of One Million Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,450,000) for the purpose of

providing funds to permanently finance the costs of the Improvements, including redeeming and paying the Series A2021 Notes in the principal amount of \$1,400,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon on June 1, 2022, and paying the costs of issuing the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the City has, in accordance with K.S.A. 10-106, published notice (the "Sale Notice") of the City's intent to sell the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the City does hereby authorize the issuance and sale of the bonds to the best bidder.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, LEAVENWORTH COUNTY, KANSAS:

- Section 1. That for the purpose of providing funds to permanently finance the costs of the Improvements, including redeeming and paying the Series A2021 Notes in the principal amount of \$1,400,000 together with accrued interest payable thereon on June 1, 2022, and paying the costs of issuing the Bonds, there is hereby authorized and directed to be issued General Obligation Bonds, Series 2022-A, of the City in the aggregate principal amount of One Million Four Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,450,000) (the "Bonds") as provided by Charter Ordinance No. 56 of the City and Article 1 of Chapter 10, Kansas Statutes Annotated, all as amended. The Bonds shall be dated and bear interest, shall mature and be payable at such times, shall be in such form, shall be subject to redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof and shall be issued in the manner prescribed and subject to the provisions, covenants and agreements set forth in a resolution of the Governing Body of the City adopted the same date as the date of the passage and approval of this Ordinance (the "Resolution").
- **Section 2.** That the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to prepare and execute the Bonds and when so executed, the Bonds shall be registered as required by law and the Governing Body shall annually make provisions for the payment of the principal of, redemption premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds as the same shall become due by levying a tax upon all the taxable property of the City.
- **Section 3**. That the City shall, and the officers, agents and employees of the City are hereby authorized and directed to, take such action and execute such other documents, certificates and instruments as may be necessary or desirable to carry out and comply with the provisions of this Ordinance and to carry out, comply with and perform the duties of the City with respect to the Bonds and the Resolution all as necessary to carry out and give effect to the transaction contemplated hereby and thereby.
- **Section 4**. That if any portion or provision of this Ordinance or the Bonds shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such portion or provisions shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance or the Bonds but this Ordinance and said Bonds shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision had not been contained herein.
- **Section 5**. That the Bonds shall be issued and sold to the purchaser thereof in accordance with both their bid for the purchase thereof and the terms and conditions of this Ordinance.
- **Section 6**. That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication in the official City newspaper.
