CALL TO ORDER - The Governing Body met in regular session and the following commission members were present: Mayor Jermaine Wilson, Mayor Pro-Tem Myron J. (Mike) Griswold, Commissioners Nancy Bauder, Larry Dedeke and Mark Preisinger.

Others present: City Manager Paul Kramer, Assistant City Manager Taylour Tedder, Fire Chief Gary Birch, Public Works Director Mike McDonald, Superintendent of Services Curtis Marks, Finance Director Ruby Maline, Parks and Recreation Director Steve Grant, Planning and Community Development Director Julie Hurley, Deputy Finance Director Brandon Mills, Public Information Officer Melissa Bower, Deputy City Clerk Cary L. Collins, City Attorney David E. Waters and City Clerk Carla K. Williamson.

Mayor Jermaine Wilson opened the meeting with the pledge of allegiance followed by silent meditation.

PRESENTATIONS:

Proclamation-Parks and Recreation Month – Parks & Recreation Director Steve Grant was present to accept the proclamation.

OLD BUSINESS:

Consideration of Previous Meeting Minutes:

Commissioner Dedeke moved to approve the minutes from the June 25, 2019 regular meeting as presented. Commissioner Griswold seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. The Mayor declared the motion carried 5-0.

Second Consideration Ordinance:

Second Consideration Ordinance No. 8106 Amending Chapter 122 Vehicles for Hire— City Clerk Carla Williamson stated there have been no changes to the ordinance since it was first introduced on June 25, 2019. Ordinance No. 8106 was presented for second consideration and a roll call vote.

Mayor Wilson called the roll and Ordinance No. 8106 was unanimously approved 5-0.

NEW BUSINESS:

Citizen Participation:

Krystal Elliott - 303 Arch Street:

 Addressed the City Commission to follow up on city regulation to allow bee apiaries in residential areas City Manager Paul Kramer stated that a memorandum was sent out to the City Commission for review and feedback. There was a consensus by the Commission to place the item on a future Study Session.

Harold Carl Pederson - 1001 10th Avenue:

- Doesn't know where his property lines are
- Received letter from the City to clear the area
- Very costly to have cleared
- Has physical limitations
- Tree was damaged in a storm and difficult to cut the tree up
- Will take time to clean up tree
- Letter from the city giving 30 days to clean up will not be able to get it done in that time doing the work himself without funding to hire someone
- Has thought about making the area a city garden for churches to use
- Received 2 different letters; one for tree and one for vegetation
- Does have poison and will use it if push comes to shove

Mayor asked the City Manager to get information to the Commission from staff on the situation.

General Items:

Review Property at 795 Spruce Street – City Attorney David Waters updated the Commission regarding the property.

- Was put on the demolition list by the City Commission in a previous meeting
- Representative of the Church appeared before the Commission to discuss; no extension was given
- No permits have been pulled although work has been done by the Church without permits
- An injunction was filed in District Court by a member of the Church
- The hearing was today (July 16, 2019) on the filing
- There was a discussion on "standing" meaning if the individual filing had property standing to bring the request and the lack of council for the church
- Judge King gave a continuance to August 21, 2019 to allow church/property to obtain legal counsel
- The Judge did not issue a restraining order or injunction; the City's demolition order technically still stands
- The Judges expectation is that this would still be a live matter when this comes back to court by the city not having demolished or that the matter has been settled in some way
- The City does have a couple options and there is no need for the Commission to make a decision tonight
 - Continue with the demolition
 - o Do nothing keep on list and hold off on enforcement/demolition until after hearing
 - o Staff could offer another remediation agreement with a reasonable deadline
 - If offer is not accepted that would be presented to the Judge or if it is accepted present that to the Judge

City Manager Kramer added that if the remediation agreement route is decided that we would also take into account and require the property owner to get permits, obtain and pay for permit for work already done and to be reimbursed for costs already incurred by the City for the demolition process.

Commissioner Preisinger asked how much the City has incurred to this point.

Ms. Hurley stated about \$1900 of invoiced fees so far. There has been other work that the city has not been invoiced for but expenses have been incurred.

Commissioner Preisinger also stated that Pastor Knighten was offered a remediation agreement and he stated that his work would stand for itself and did not sign the remediation agreement. Ms. Julie said that was correct.

Commissioner Preisinger asked if there was power or water. Ms. Hurley said there was not power or water and the property is uninhabitable.

Commissioner Preisinger asked if the taxes were current. Ms. Hurley stated she believes they are current.

Jed Knighten Pastor of the Church addressed the Commission:

- In reference to the statement that he refused to sign the agreement, that was not his intent, he never knew he had to sign the remediation agreement
- Worked out of town and did not see the letter
- He gave the letter to the church secretary
- Dropped the ball by not reading the agreement

Commissioner Preisinger stated that he recalled someone from code did meet with Pastor Knighten personally about the remediation agreement if memory serves correctly. Ms. Hurley said that is what they have in their notes.

Pastor Knighten said he met with Lee but she had no letter with her. He had to go out of town and did not make it to the meeting. At no time would he have refused to sign the remediation agreement.

- Did know that he was supposed to be working on the building and that he was to be working on the outside
- He is from Texas and where he comes from you do not need permits for anything that is not structural; if he had known he needed a permit he would have gotten a permit

Commissioner Griswold asked what he would do between now and August 21.

Pastor Knighten replied:

- Some siding could not be repaired
- Has already replaced windows and a door
- Has a stop order until permits have been obtained
- Willing to get permits whatever they cost and will do his very best to compensate the City for money spent
- The work in the remediation will be completed in the next 10 days.

Ms. Hurley stated that if the City is satisfied, our legal counsel could go before the court and let them know the matter is closed.

Mr. Kramer stated that we believe that someone is inhabiting the structure and there is not a functioning sewer. We would need access to the structure to do a dye test to see if there is functioning sewer and would recommend that be added as a condition in the remediation agreement.

Mr. Knighten said no one is living in the structure. He is in and out of the building and he has some personal property in there.

Commissioner Preisinger moved to suspend the demolition of 795 Spruce until Aug 13, 2019 until a remediation agreement has been signed and that all items and costs have been taken care of, permits pulled and a repayment plan is in place and reviewed by the Commission. Commissioner Bauder seconded the motion and the motion was unanimously approved. The Mayor declared the motion carried 5-0.

Budget and Capital Improvements Program (CIP) Presentation – City Manager Paul Kramer provided an overview of the Budget and CIP via a PowerPoint presentation. The City Commission will hold a Work Session on July 11-12, 2019 to discuss.

- Balanced budget no millage increase
- Redistribution of resources to focus on roads
- Includes the addition of Rental Property Coordinator and Civil Engineering positions
- Implementation of the salary increases from the classification and compensation study
- Continued subsidization of the Community Center operations
- Increase in employee health, welfare and retirement expenses
- 3% increase in assessed valuation
- 3% increase in total sales tax revenue
- Proposed refuse rate increase of \$1.35 per month
- Proposed sewer rate increase on average or \$1.10 per month

First Consideration Ordinances:

First Consideration Ordinance Amending Development Regulations-Signs – Planning and Community Development Director Julie Hurley presented for first consideration an ordinance amending Appendix E of the Code of Ordinances, Development Regulations Sec. 8.04 Permits. The specific change is to Sec. 8.04-23 regarding political signs. The amendment would add the following: "Signs may not be erected more than 45 days prior to an election, and must be removed within three days after the election."

Commissioner Bauder brought up the issue of signs in the right-of-way and confusion on what is and is not in the right-of-way.

There was a consensus by the Commission to place on first consideration.

CONSENT AGENDA:

Commissioner Bauder moved to approve claims for June 22, 2019 through July 5, 2019, in the amount of \$1,606,936.60; Net amount for Payroll #14 effective July 5, 2019, in the amount of \$392,007.64; (No Police & Fire Pension). AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC 8.04, PERMITS OF APPENDIX E OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS BY AMENDING AND PROVIDING ADDITIONAL AND SUBSTITUTE PROVISIONS.

There have been no changes since first consideration.

ORDINANCE NO. 8107

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC 8.04, PERMITS OF APPENDIX E OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS BY AMENDING AND PROVIDING ADDITIONAL AND SUBSTITUTE PROVISIONS.

Whereas, an ordinance of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas, Amending Sec. 8.04 of Appendix E; Development Regulations of the Code of Ordinances; repealing any and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict therewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS:

Section 1. That the following amendments to Sec. 8.04, of the Appendix E, Development Regulations of the Code of Ordinance of the City of Leavenworth, Kansas is hereby deleted in its entirety and amended to read as follows:

8.04. - Permits.

A. Permits required.

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, it shall be unlawful for any person to erect, construct, enlarge, move, modify, alter, or convert any sign in the city, or cause the same to be done, without first obtaining a sign permit for such sign as required by this chapter. Issuance of a permit is contingent upon the sign being in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations of the city.
- 2. Every sign permit issued by the director shall become null and void if installation is not commenced within 120 days from the date of approval of such permit. If work authorized by such permit is suspended or abandoned for 120 days from the date of permit approval, a new permit shall be required for such work, even if no changes have been made to the original sign plan.
- 3. *Required information*. Application shall be made upon forms furnished by the planning and community development department and shall be accompanied by such information as may be required to assure compliance with all appropriate laws and regulations of the city.
- B. Fee increase for failure to obtain permit. If the director discovers or is informed of a sign constructed or being constructed that requires a permit that has been constructed, installed, or erected without a permit according to this sign code, s/he shall collect three times the permit fee specified for the type of sign in question.
- C. Signs excluded from permit. The following signs are not required to have a permit; however, these signs shall otherwise comply with this section and all other applicable provisions of the sign code.

- 1. Directional signs.
- 2. Holiday decorations.
- 3. Home security and neighborhood watch signs.
- 4. Identification signs.
- 5. Official signs.
- 6. Name plate signs. Where multiple tenants share the same rear door, the sign may display the name and address of each tenant. These signs shall not exceed four square feet.
- 7. Window signs, as further described in section 8.10 F. of this chapter.
- 8. Contractor signs: One free standing, non-illuminated contractor's sign, not to exceed eight square feet of sign surface, shall be permitted for each contractor if the property is zoned residential, or not to exceed 32 square feet if the property is zoned other than residential. The sign shall not be installed before commencing work on the project or the issuance of a building permit for the project and the sign shall be removed upon completion of the project.
- 9. Public interest signs that do not exceed the size limitations.
- 10. Address signs.
- 11. Commercial real estate signs not exceeding 32 square feet in area per sign face with two faces permitted. Signs shall not exceed eight feet in height. Signs are limited to one sign per street frontage, with a maximum of two signs for each project. Signs must be located at least ten feet from the edge of the curb or behind any existing public sidewalks and may not be illuminated or have an electronic changeable face.
- 12. Residential real estate signs not exceeding three square feet in area. Signs are limited to one on-premises sign per street frontage, and two off-premises signs permitted only with permission of property owner. Signs must be located at least ten feet from the edge of the curb or behind any existing public sidewalks and may not be illuminated or have an electronic changeable face.
- 13. Garage sale signs may only be placed at the site of the sale. All garage sale signs shall be removed immediately upon completion of the sale. Garage sale signs include sample and yard sale signs. Garage sale signs shall not exceed four square feet per sign, with two faces per sign permitted. A garage sale permit shall be obtained as required by city code of ordinances.
- 14. Signs carried by a person.
- 15. Costumed people promoting a business or event.
- 16. Flags, pennants, emblems, memorial tablets, cornerstone etches, monuments and insignia of any governmental body, public or private school, church, synagogue or other place used primarily for worship, community centers, or other public, semi-public, or civic organizations or other similar noncommercial entity, when not displayed in connection with a commercial promotion or as an advertising device; provided that not more than three flags, pennants or insignia shall be displayed on any building, structure or premises, unless

- specifically herein provided. Any other provisions as applicable regarding display of the American flag as contained in Title 4, U.S. Code.
- 17. Integral decorative or architectural features of buildings, so long as these features do not contain letters, trademarks, moving parts or lights.
- 18. Decorative landscape markers, which may include logos or trademarks.
- 19. Signs attached to a currently licensed, operational and legally parked or legally moving vehicle.
- 20. Temporary signs containing non-commercial messages at churches, synagogues and other similar places of worship, community centers, public and private schools and buildings or structures owned or leased and used by other public, semi-public, or civic organizations.
- 21. Special event signs shall be exempt from a permit as follows: Signs of a temporary nature for campaigns, drives, seasonal events of civic or philanthropic organizations not to exceed 32 square feet. These signs must be placed on private property and must be removed within three days after the event.
- 22. A new sign permit shall not be required unless (a) the existing sign base, pole, or face is nonconforming to these regulations or, (b) the existing sign base or pole is going to be relocated, changed, or enlarged.
- 23. Political signs may be placed on private property only after permission has been granted by the owner of the property or his or her authorized agent. No political signs are permitted on public right-of-way or on public property. In commercial or industrial areas, signs shall not exceed 32 square feet in area per face. In residential areas, signs shall not exceed three square feet per face. Signs shall not be placed where they interfere with intersection sight distances, and may not be affixed to any utility poles, trees, street lights, bridges, benches or similar public structures. Signs may not be erected more than 45 days prior to an election, and must be removed within three days after the election.
- 24. Contractor signs as further defined in section 8.07 D.
- 25. Decorative light pole banners, which may not include any business or advertising information.

Section 2. That all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Governing Body hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance, and each section, subsection, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases be declared unconstitutional.

Section 4. That nothing in this ordinance hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding impending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed as cited in Section

2 of this ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this ordinance.

Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon publication in the official city newspaper.

CONSIDER APPROVAL OF LOW BID FOR THE THORNTON STREET IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

ISSUE:

Consider the bids received for the Thornton Street Improvements Project.

BACKGROUND:

In 2016, Affinis Corporation completed a Concept Design Study for Thornton Street from 10th Avenue to 2nd Avenue incorporating the results of a TEAP (Traffic Engineering Assistance Program) Study done in 2015. Upon review of the Concept Design Study, the Commission identified Thornton Street as a priority project with the desire to start construction in 2019. On June 5, 2018, the City Commission approved a design contract with Affinis Corporation for the design of the project from 10th Avenue to 5th Street.

The project will construct a 28' wide road that will include the following:

- New curb and gutter
- New storm drain inlets to include 2 eco-friendly storm inlets and piping
- New crossroad storm boxes
- New sidewalks and ADA ramps on both sides of the roadway
- New traffic signal at 2nd Avenue & Thornton
- New roadway of 10" asphalt with 6" of AB-3 base and geogrid

Additional work will include the replacement and/or repair of all sanitary sewer mains and service lines within the project area. The alternate bid item is for lining the repaired sanitary sewer mains.

On April 25, 2019, staff held a public meeting for all property owners in the project area. The Land Company has been acquiring easements on behalf of the City since the meeting.

Construction drawings were adjusted based on public comments and the project was advertised in the Leavenworth Times, sent to area plan rooms and Drexel Technologies. A mandatory pre-bid meeting was held on June 26, 2019 and bids were opened on July 10, 2019.

The results of the bid opening are shown below in the bid tabulation.

Inspection work will be by a combination of contract inspection services and City staff.



ISSUE:



ISSUE:

Consider approval of Change Order No. 1 to the contract for construction of the New Lawrence Road Improvements Project with LEXECO.

BACKGROUND:

In June 2018, the City Commission approved the low bid of LEXECO for the project with construction starting in August 2018. As construction progressed, staff became aware of the following issues;

- The drainage field designed to be located on adjoining property could not be constructed as
 the property owners would not give the City a drainage easement. This required the removal
 of two existing storm boxes and associated pipe, installing a new larger curb inlet, a junction
 box, additional piping, and the tear-out and replacement of geo-grid, base rock and asphalt.
- 2. The curbing to be replaced along New Lawrence Road east from the 20th St. intersection was wider than what showed on the plans and was not priced accordingly in the bid.

The attached LEXECO cost sheets dated 9/11/18 and 10/01/18 relate to the work in item # 1 above. (\$17,175.00 & \$17,950.37)

The cost sheet submitted by Freedom Concrete relates to item # 2 above. (\$1,393.00)
